Note especially Emily VanCamp (whom we loved on Revenge) plaving the tough role of a tough mediator-in both official languages. Who knew? Co-produced by the pretty fabulous island creature Barbara Doran. Boundaries is a tour de force of storytelling for all the right reasons. We should feel proud to live in a country that supports a film like this.







Our chosen winners join us for the annual St. John's International Women's Film Festival and are given full access to the Festival screenings, VIP Galas and networking parties, as well as attending the [Interactive] Film Industry Forum – a series of professional development workshops and panels, to further their training.

They will be matched with leading industry experts from across Canada for one-on-one consultations and meetings to further strengthen their projects, including an Interactive Bootcamp with Patricia Bergeron, as well as a reserved seat at our Face 2 Face pitch session.

This year we have extended the outreach of the IIP, now accepting applications not only from Atlantic Canada but also Quebec. We are also excited to announce a Montréal Incubator Residency, in partnership with CBC Newfoundland & Labrador and Les Rendez-vous du cinéma québécois. We will select three IIP alumni to receive follow up consultation meetings with Patricia Bergeron before they travel to Montreal in February 2017 to further their project development by attending Rendez-vous Pro, a three-day gathering of professionals from Canada and Europe who will discuss, network and potentially work together on future interactive projects.



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


